SHAKESPEARE: THE TIMELINE

1564: BIRTH

Shakespeare is born on or around April 23 in Stratford-upon-Avon.




1571: SCHOOL

Probably started studies at Stratford's King Edward VI Grammar School.




1582: MARRIED

Marries Anne Hathaway, who is 3 months pregnant.



1583 & 1585: KIDS Births of Susanna and twins Hamnet and Judith.



1585-1592: LOST

The Lost Years! No documentation of Shakespeare's activities during this period.



1592: LONDON

Emerges as established playwright in London, with several hit plays.




1593 & 1594: POEMS

Publishes Venus & Adonis and The Rape of Lucrece while all theatres are closed by plague.



1594: COMPANY

Becomes sharer and primary playwright of the newly-formed Lord Chamberlain's Men acting company.



1596: LOSS Son Hamnet dies. aged 11. Cause of death unknown.



1597: REAL ESTATE Sufficiently successful enough to buy New Place, the second largest house in Stratford.



1599: THEATRE The outdoor Globe Theatre is built by the Lord Chamberlain's Men in Southwark.



1603: PROMOTION

James I becomes King of England and patron of the Lord Chamberlain's Men, now the King's Men.



1608: INDOORS

The King's Men start performing at the indoor, candle-lit Blackfriars Theatre during the winters.




1613: RETIREMENT

Stops writing plays and moves back to Stratford, where he is a prominent landowner and businessman.



1616: DEATH

Dies in Stratford on April 23, of unknown causes. Buried in Holy Trinity Church.



1623: IMMORTALITY

First Folio published by Shakespeare's friends, collecting and preserving his plays for posterity.

(All's Well That Ends Well)

(Henry IV Part I)
